NEW RICHMOND BRIDGE AND BYPASS \$500M JOINT INVESTMENT BY NSW AND AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENTS

A bypass to the north of North Richmond and a new bridge approximately 500 metres downstream of the existing Richmond Bridge was recently announced with a \$400 million commitment from the Australian Government and \$100 million from the NSW State Government.

This is the biggest commitment to road infrastructure in Hawkesbury's history and will provide welcome relief to drivers, reducing travel time through the area by up to 12 minutes.

The green route, as it is referred to, proposes to upgrade six intersections and two existing roads, as well as providing an

active transport connection for cyclists and pedestrians.

Community consultation continues and residents and stakeholders are encouraged to have their say.

This new crossing at Richmond will complement the additional Grose River crossing which is funded through contributions from the Redbank development.

The Grose River high level bridge route, will move vehicles along Grose River Road, across the Grose River then onto Springwood Road and then towards Castlereagh Road, giving motorists a further river crossing in Hawkesbury.

COOLING THE HAWKESBURY



Under the NSW Government's Greening Our City Program, Hawkesbury City Council received a grant of \$382,000 to plant over 300 trees in Hobartville, Windsor, Bligh Park and South Windsor.

Quality green and open public spaces are important to everyone and this is an excellent initiative to boost the number of trees in Hawkesbury, to make it an even more comfortable and vibrant place for the community to enjoy.

I recently met with Mayor of Hawkesbury, Clr Patrick Conolly at Church Street Reserve, South Windsor to consider the greening possibilities that will make this park an even more attractive destination.

The program is part of the Premier's Priority to plant one million trees throughout NSW by 2022.

To increase community involvement and tree planting on private land, the NSW Government has also partnered with Bunnings Warehouse to give away 25,600 free trees to 10,500 eligible households in Greater Sydney between June and October this year.
